Minutes taken by Angela Paul

1. Welcome and introductions by the Mayor

Cllr. Louise Eastwood welcomed everyone to the meeting and stated that she and the Councillors appreciated residents supporting the meeting.

2. Apologies for absence

Apologies had been received from Councillors. J. Anderson and J. Beesley, and residents Mrs D. Sparks & Mr. A Blackford.

3. Minutes of the Annual Town Meeting of the 11th April 2017

Minutes of the Annual Town Meeting held on the 11th April 2017 previously circulated were proposed and approved by Councillors. J. Love and K. Everett as a true record.

4. Matters arising from the minutes

None.

5. Topics and questions raised by residents in advance

Question from Miss Fane

“Should hard up families, at a time of grief, be forced to pay double for re-opening an existing cemetery plot to inter their relative, when they are not in any way adding to the pressure on the Council’s cemeteries?”

We quite understand the Council’s needs to limit over use of the cemetery facilities by people who have left Uckfield, but Jacqueline’s interment on top of her twin, in the plot (W258) she prepaid for, will not take up any more valuable space and she only briefly left the town after 19 years because of her terminal illness.”

As per copy of email to the Mayor, ref: Jacqueline Robinson, resident for 19 years in Uckfield until shortly before her death

The Town Clerk stated that policies regarding burials and ashes interments are always sensitive matters and the Town Council respect that when you’re grieving for loved ones, to consider the practicalities and costs of any funeral, is the last thing on a person’s mind.

The Town Clerk firstly clarified that the Town Council does not charge double to re-open any existing cemetery plot to inter a relative, but to inter when the person is no longer a resident of Uckfield (classified as a non-parishioner).

Individual circumstances are often complex and this was a specific case which should be considered on its own merits. Further information would be required to clarify the circumstances. The Clerk therefore suggested that conversations continue outside of this meeting with the next of kin.

The Town Clerk advised that if individuals find they are struggling to fund the unexpected costs of a funeral or the burial of a family member, that it may be worth contacting the Citizen’s Advice Bureau or Wealden District Council. Wealden District Council may be able to assist and any costs incurred claimed from the deceased estate.

Question from Mr & Mrs Woodham

(i) Request for Uckfield Town Council to approach East Sussex County Council regarding the potential danger to pedestrians with vehicles passing on the left hand side across the ‘pedestrian footpath’ running along the side of the Cinque Ports Club when stationary vehicles are waiting to turn right into Church Street from the High Street.

This occurrence has been witnessed on several occasions by pedestrians on this footpath and/or at various locations whilst crossing at this junction.

*(ii) Option for safety improvement
Traffic light filter into Church Street from the High Street to ease flow and safety.*

The Town Clerk advised that last year, Uckfield Town Council collated a list of key issues affecting main access corridors leading into Uckfield town. This included issues relating to junctions, road safety, pedestrian safety and congestion etc. This information would form part of an investigation by Highways engineers to assess what improvements could be made to the main access corridors into the town. The Church Street junction was raised as part of this report and suggestions put forward to filter traffic turning right into Church Street at this junction (lane markings or lights). The importance of safety for pedestrians was also raised at this point.

At review meetings with ESCC, the Town Council has made it very clear that the safety of pedestrians was a high priority and various options had been put forward but it had been considered a very difficult junction with a limited amount of space. The Town Council would however continue to push the need for improvements here. The Town Council were aware that there may be some S106 monies (developer contributions) available as part of a phase four of highway improvements in the town.

Cllr. Bennett advised that over the past two decades the Town Council had been persisting with trying to get something done about the junction and we were now much closer to actually getting something done and progressing to next stage.

Cllr. Macve suggested that if people adopted common courteous to each other and just slowed down slightly whilst driving up the hill drivers would have time to turn into Church Street and the problem would be resolved.

Resident Mr Cox suggested that consideration could be given to have 'No Right Turn' at the junction and all traffic continue down to Grange Road and follow road round to come out by the Cinque Ports junction and travel straight across in to Church Street.

Cllr. Eastwood confirmed that this suggestion had been considered in the past together with various phasing options of the traffic lights.

Mr Lawson (President of the Chamber of Commerce) asked if consideration had been given to installing an iron bollard on the corner of the pavement which would restrict vehicles crossing onto pavement.

Cllr Bennett advised that some years ago there had been a road sign on the corner but it had been knocked down by a lorry and not replaced.

Mr Woodham had concerns about the length of time such consideration was taking as this had been raised by residents at the last Annual Town meeting and he had hoped by now to have seen a more pro-active response from ESCC. Mr Woodham hoped that it would not take an accident involving pedestrians to happen before work was carried out at the junction.

6. Consideration of the Town Council's Annual Report

There being no questions regarding the previously circulated Town Council's Annual Report the report was noted by all attendees.

7. Questions from the floor

Community Safety

Resident Mr Fennings asked if there was any chance of improvement to policing in the Town. He had lived in the town for 35 years ago and he had not seen a member of the police for sometime and he felt that a town the size of Uckfield should have a police presence in the town all the time. He thought that if there was more of a presence in the town it would deter the current drivers driving irresponsibly “doing donuts in the road and making a lot of noise” on the estate near his house at night.

He wanted to know why there was often so many police cars parked at the Uckfield Police station.

Inspector Gross advised that the lack of obvious policing on the beat was a consistent theme when he attended meetings within Wealden. However, as everybody was aware it was a constant challenge as to the type of policing that can be provided when the budgets for police services were being cut. Wealden district is a very large spread out district and residents would have seen some significant changes especially to the reduction in numbers of PCSO's within the district. He was currently looking to see what impact the forced reduction had had on the area. The Police were now putting in place a variety of different methods of policing and were working together with local community groups such as Neighbourhood Watch and Speed Awareness groups e.g. SID.

With regards to the fleet of police cars parked at the Uckfield Police Station he confirmed that the cars were parked there but in fact there was no more than one sergeant and four officers at the station at one time. He confirmed Uckfield Police Station was the only station other than the one at Eastbourne that had a 24/7 presence. He stated that the model of policing had changed.

Cllr. Eastwood stated that there had been a number of incidents within the town including in and around the Civic Centre building involving a small number of youths and the police had responded positively by working with the teenagers, their families and using other various strategies. It had been noted that the incidents had decreased significantly.

Cllr Eastwood also advised that a Community Group had been set up with representatives from the Police, Town Council, the Chamber of Commerce and other interested local businesses, youth community groups and the Uckfield College to explore ways of engaging with local teenagers and provide activities for young people.

Facilities for young people

Resident Mr Rixon advised that he had not lived in the area for long but felt it was a very family friendly town but he had noticed that there was not a lot to do within the town for teenagers and questioned whether the Town Council were investigating how to make it more interesting. However, he did stress that he did not have any sympathy for those youngsters who had damaged property and caused a nuisance to others.

Cllr Bennett stated that the one upside of the recent troubles was that the Town Council had connected with the police and other local agencies to form a

productive working relationship. Twenty years ago, a lot of good work was undertaken by the Uckfield Trust working together with teenagers who had expressed a desire for a skatepark at Victoria Recreation Ground, this was achieved and a lot of other good work was done but unfortunately things had evolved and the momentum of the group and some facilities was lost.

Chief Inspector Anita Turner confirmed that Sussex Police were working and exploring initiatives in other local areas to engage with the youth in the community and would continue to do so in Uckfield and explore the various funding opportunities available to provide outlets and facilities within the town for young people.

Cllr Eastwood advised that with the closure of the Uckfield Youth Centre there was no real youth facility and the various agencies were working with the College to see if funding could be found to repair or purchase the building in order that it may be retained as a facility. However, the estimated cost of repairs to the building were very high with it was thought that they may be in the region of £250,000 due to the removal and replacement of the roof and the asbestos that had been found in the building which required expert removal.

Cllr. Eastwood advised that the supermarkets in the town might be able to offer support with their token schemes and the group were exploring other avenues of funding.

Mr Lawson asked if consideration had been given to boxing in the asbestos rather than removal, as it was not always necessary to remove asbestos from a building. Mr. Lawson also requested if the Chamber of Commerce could be involved with the Community Group discussions and updates. He would like to attend future meetings as it might be a project that the Chamber and business organisations could assist with, in terms of services or funding streams.

Mr Woodham advised that in the past he had been involved with building works where asbestos was boxed in rather than removed from a building and it had proved to be very successful and obviously less costly.

Cllr Bennett mentioned that as a result of a new initiative set up by the Town Council with students at Uckfield College, the Town Council now had a youth representative Daniel Manvell as part of council. Mr. Manvell was a shining example for youngsters being involved in the community and raising awareness of the needs of young people.

Cllr Bennett emphasised that it was a very small minority who caused a problem and the majority of young people were a credit to themselves and their families. He advised that he had family who attended Uckfield College and received the weekly newsletter, and you only had to see the newsletter to know all about the great achievements the students have made.

Litter on public highways

Mrs Noble asked who was responsible for collecting the litter around the town, in particular if Wealden District Council was the authority for clearing litter from the bypass which at the present time was looking awful. She was aware of the good work that Brighter Uckfield carried out in the town and that some of their members had recently cleared an area along the bypass.

The Town Clerk advised that on behalf of the Town Council a letter had been sent due to be sent to ESCC, WDC and Highways Agency to start a conversation between the authorities to work together to see what could be done about the litter. The Clerk stated that unfortunately litter was a nationwide problem.

The Town Council's Ground staff sometimes clear litter from land that was not town council land but due to concerns with regard to health and safety along the A22, the Town Council's Grounds staff were not permitted to clear litter from the by-pass. The recent problem appeared to be that there had been some confusion between authorities and WDC should have litter picked prior to ESCC cutting the grass alongside the bypass.

Mr Cox advised that he felt that the wrong bins were at Victoria Pleasure Ground and if consideration could be given to installing lids on the bins as this would stop animals pulling out the rubbish on to the ground and the wind blowing the rubbish all over the area.

Cllr. Dean advised that the possible provision of alternative bins with lids was currently being discussed by the Environment & Leisure Committee but they were expensive.

Cllr. Eastwood wished to thank Brighter Uckfield for their hard work, without the work of the volunteers the town would look in a worse state but wanted to stress that residents should not be encouraged to access the area along the by-pass as vehicles were driving at speed.

Road signage

Resident Mr Selby asked if there was any further information regarding finding and re-instating the missing Bow Bell Sign from Ridgewood.

Mr Selby raised concerns about the preliminary construction works at Ridgewood on Lewes Road and in particular the speed of the traffic coming off the Isfield roundabout towards the temporary traffic lights as there was no reduction in speed sign and traffic was still travelling at 50 miles per hour. Mr Selby had spoken to Walkers the construction company and they advised that they had put sign up but it now appeared to be missing. Mr Selby asked if ESCC could do something about it before an accident occurred.

Mr Selby also raised concerns about the litter being created from the building site, and that a different type of bin at Ridgewood Recreation Ground would be useful.

Mr Selby stated that the lack of police presence at Ridgewood was a concern and in fact a house adjacent to the recreation ground had been broken into earlier in the week. Also for the past three nights there had been a considerable amount of noise and anti-social behaviour occurring in the Ridgewood car park. This had all been reported to the police.

The Town Clerk advised that the missing signs had been raised with ESCC and Taylor Wimpey (and their contractors) and they were not aware that the signs had been removed by the contractors. Regarding the litter from the building site,

she agreed that this was a valid point and she would go back to ESCC to advise about the concerns and ask what would be required from the contractors.

The Town Clerk was pleased to hear that residents were working with the Police and letting them know when incidents happened so the police were made aware of the hot spots in the town.

Mr Fennings asked who was responsible for clearing the Twittens and in particular the path alongside the fire station as the nettles etc. were beginning to grow across the path.

The Town Clerk advised that she would check as there was shared or variations in ownership for the Twittens and would therefore ask for work to be undertaken.

Mr Fennings reported that some rubbish had been dumped at the bottom of Scarletts Close following some building work carried out in adjoining house and the amount of rubbish was increasing.

The Town Clerk advised that she would ask the Ground staff to visit and check the site.

Footways and cycleways

Mr Rixon, as a new resident to the town, noted that as there were only two ways through the town there was often a traffic bottle neck created and asked if long term consideration had been given to providing additional ways of crossing the river and providing more cycle routes within the town. He was aware that the Government did have monies available to give grants to towns for cycle route improvements.

The Town Clerk advised that the Town Council was keen to promote health and wellbeing in the town but there were restrictions and difficulties with the landscape of the town. The council was keen to see more accessibility to open spaces and to become involved in possibility of providing a longer river walk. It was also hoped that developments such as that at Ridgewood Farm, would create new foot and cycleways to open up access between the south and centre of the town. Within Phase 2 of the development at Ridgewood there was a requirement to put in a footpath from to the new SANGS land adjacent to the bypass to link up to Victoria Pleasure Ground.

Facilities for young people (2)

Mr Manvell advised that there was very little for young people within the town now that they did not have access to the Youth Centre which was now empty following the cuts by ESCC.

Cllr Eastwood re-confirmed that there was discussion about re-opening the building between the various agencies and the college but the building did need a lot of repair work.

Mrs Sweatland asked if parents were also going to be asked to be involved as it was for the benefit of their children.

Mr Sanders advised that it was difficult to encourage youngsters to become involved in youth organisations where they were provided. The Air Cadets

headquarters is based on the college campus and the membership for Uckfield ATC was low as there was a shortage of young people joining up. Regrettably if the numbers dropped by too much the funding from the Ministry of Defence may be removed. The activities, experiences and opportunities offered to youngsters were excellent. The subscription was £10.00 per month for eight months of the year and the cadets also had the opportunity to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. Mr Sanders reported that there was also a need for civilian adult helpers. The group have tried advertising for more cadets and helpers but there were cost implications with advertising.

Mr Manvell suggested that perhaps a representative from the ATC could attend one of the assemblies at the College to talk about the organisation.

Cllr. Eastwood mentioned that when joining various organisations sometimes there were cost implications for families who may be struggling but there may be funds available from outside agencies. The 3VA may also be able to assist and were very helpful at finding available funding pots for organisations.

Mr Cox said many people in Year 10 were concerned about their future plans and it would be good to have a Hub where the teenagers could meet and work together with each other and outside agencies to gain some work experience. Mr Cox asked if it was possible for the Town Council to purchase the Youth Centre and rent back.

Cllr. Eastwood advised that it was not an option for the Town Council to buy the Youth Centre as the Town Council was still making payments to ESCC for the purchase of The Hub building.

It was also stated at the meeting that the Uckfield Volunteer Bureau were focusing on a new initiative this year 'Volunteer with the Youth'.

Cllr. Bennett advised that the project would be taken forward working with the College, Police and Youth teams.

Chief Inspector Anita Turner advised that there were Police Funds from criminal gains which could be used to assist families and managed grant funding but there were certain criteria which had to be fulfilled. The group would look at ways of applying for pots of money for the development of a Youth Centre and youth support.

Cllr. Bennett reminded everybody that this year was the 100th Anniversary of the RAF and the 75th Anniversary for the cadets, and that without the assistance of the Uckfield unit many of the events in the town e.g. Weald on the Field and the Carnival would not be able to function without the cadets' support as marshals and that it was a great organisation that should be supported.

Conclusion

As there were no further questions Cllr. Eastwood thanked the police and everybody for attending the meeting.

Cllr. Eastwood took the opportunity to pass on her personal thanks to the Town Clerk and Officers and Town Councillors for all their help and support as she steps down at the end of her three-year term as Town Mayor.

Cllr Eastwood thanked both Inspector Anita Turner and Jonathan Gross for attending the meeting and assisting to answer questions in relation to community safety.

Our Town Mayor's Annual Review of 2018-19

2018-19 has been a great year which has seen a number of projects delivered and the ideas of this term of Town Councillors come to fruition.

Town Council staff have continued to maintain good working relationships with our key partner agencies and the town's community and voluntary organisations. This has helped to connect people and identify what information and support the various agencies and groups can provide to each other.

The year began with a first for Uckfield; the appointment of a Town Crier. After a recruitment and selection process, an interview which involved the applicants carrying out a test cry in front of an interview panel with one of the longest serving criers in the country - Seaford's very own Mr Peter White, it was agreed to appoint Mr Ian Bedwell to the role. His robes were ready just in time for the town's summer events calendar, and we look forward to seeing Uckfield's Town Crier on the High Street with regular messages of communication throughout 2019.



We were extremely pleased to see the installation of a new CCTV system in the town with six new HD cameras. The process had taken some months to find the right model and modern technology which would provide good quality footage at a reasonable price.

As a result Uckfield joined the Sussex Police i-witness CCTV partnership. This provides a direct feed through from the cameras to the Sussex Police HQ control room and ensures that any footage recorded can be regularly monitored and reviewed by CCTV operators for the purpose of crime prevention and public safety. Uckfield Chamber of Commerce have been a great support to the project by covering the costs of the sixth camera located near to the Bellbrook business park, to support businesses in the west of the town.

We carried out a long overdue refurbishment of Luxfords Restaurant. The restaurant had not received any attention for some years but in October 2018, a full decorative refurbishment was undertaken using local contractors. The project was fully managed in-house, used local tradesmen and materials and the project was not only delivered on schedule but also under budget. The Town Council is looking forward to building the profile of the restaurant over the next financial year, with themed evening events, the opportunity to book the space out for business meetings or functions, and will be hosting the next Chamber of Commerce meeting in May.

The Town Council has ensured that it has remained involved in discussions regarding highway improvements and footway provision. The schemes put forward to introduce traffic calming measures in Lewes Road near to the entrances of the Ridgewood Place development have not been considered appropriate to date and it has taken some time to find the right balance. Having been part of partnership meetings with Sussex Police, East Sussex Fire & Rescue, Brighton & Hove Buses and East Sussex Highways, a design has now been produced which will assist with reducing the speed of traffic in this area and improve both vehicular and pedestrian safety. This will be communicated to residents shortly.

Discussions are underway with East Sussex Highways to clarify the details of the proposed design for the bus station improvements (phase 3 of the town's highway improvement scheme). The materials used and design put together are important to ensure that the proposals meet the needs of Uckfield residents and in particular, all users of public transport. It is hoped that the facilities provided will provide a more comfortable environment in which members of the public can wait for bus services, and support the increasing number of bus services and traffic flow through this area. The Town Council also instigated a meeting with the owner of the full Ridgewood Farm site (Welbeck Strategic Land) to discuss their original proposals for footways and access points. Wealden District Council and East Sussex Rights of Way team were present and by working together, it is hoped that pedestrian access becomes an important part of this large-scale development.

The Town Council has been involved in a number of new initiatives in the town over the past year which has included working with other key event organisers, to see how we can communicate more collectively about the town's events calendar. We have worked with Tesco, Uckfield Chamber of Commerce, Uckfield Volunteer Centre, East Sussex County Council and Sussex Police to get the youth club back up and running at the Youth Centre in Downsview Crescent. Preparations are underway to launch this, which will initially be open to year 7s, at the end of April 2019. We have provided a financial contribution towards the new parkrun being set up by Uckfield College, Uckfield Runners and Buxted Park Hotel. This will be a fantastic opportunity for Uckfield residents to take part in both a healthy and sociable event on a weekly basis; continuing to promote good health and wellbeing in Uckfield's attractive surroundings.

The Mayor's Charity Ball raised a fantastic £1,800 towards the Uckfield & District Lion's Club, who play a key role in supporting individuals and local groups within the community of Uckfield and the surrounding villages. Organisations such as the Lions are integral to our communities particularly in the rural areas, and with the on-going pressure on public services to do more with less, it is often the community and voluntary organisations who meet the gaps in service provision.

So on that note, I would like to say a big thank you to all of our residents, local businesses, community groups and voluntary organisations, for your contribution and most importantly, for making Uckfield such a beautiful and community spirited place to live.

General Purposes Committee

The General Purposes Committee has responsibility for looking after the Council's property portfolio, for overseeing the proper operation of financial procedures and spending, and for ensuring that staff employment issues are addressed and resolved.

Now in my third year as Chair of General Purposes, it will be my last in the Chair's seat. It has been a thoroughly rewarding time, and I have learnt a great deal through the process about the council's buildings, finances and procedures. We have delivered a number of projects in the past year to improve our current facilities and strengthen our policies. The following report provides just a few examples.

Property

In 2018-19 it was agreed that more attention needed to be given to the Town Council's buildings and one of the Town Council's annual priorities was to focus on improving the condition and decoration of our buildings, and to consider their use in terms of whether any changes could enable these spaces to be better utilised.

With a new Facilities Manager in place in summer 2018, work got underway to push forward with the decoration of our main building, the Civic Centre. With improvements to lighting, signage and the general condition of the building, alongside project managing a full refurbishment of the Luxfords restaurant and bar area, the Civic Centre offers modern smart facilities. The Civic Centre has seven rooms of varying sizes available to hire for meetings, functions and events with free WI-FI and ground level disabled access. We have also been looking at our equipment and facilities within the Weald Hall to assist with larger events and entertainment productions, to ensure that the quality of the sound, lighting and technical equipment is user friendly.

A review has been undertaken of the Town Council's service contracts. With a portfolio of buildings the Town Council has historically worked with a number of contractors on a variety of contracts and utility/maintenance agreements. These have been reviewed, aligned and the detail of the contracts re-established which has saved the Town Council in the region of £2,500. The Town Council's insurance cover was reviewed in June 2018, which also resulted in a reduction in cost to the Town Council and leaseholders.

All of the Town Council's health and safety risk assessments were reviewed and five yearly electrical inspections have been carried out in the Town Council's main buildings. The British Safety Council were invited in, to undertake an audit of our workplace health and safety. This was a particularly useful exercise and highlighted where we could further strengthen our current processes. Engagement has also been increased with our leaseholders to raise awareness of and routinely assess their compliance with matters such as fire safety.

Along with minor repairs and decoration, the Town Council's annual maintenance programme saw work prioritised on the cemetery wall at Snatts Road, Signal Box, Foresters Hall and Victoria Pavilion. In the past 18 months the Town Council has been considering how we can obtain better value by using a large tendering process for some works and using local contractors for smaller or more specialist projects.

Lease agreements were renewed with existing tenants at the Small Hall (Foresters Hall Chapel), the Signal Box and the Source.

Finance

The Town Council received another excellent report from external auditors which advised that the council's finances and processes were sound, and positive feedback was received from the internal auditors on their routine interim visits.

We provided £41,285 in grant funding to community groups and local organisations through our community grant funding programme in 2018/19. We continued to support the local Saturday 262 bus service with a financial contribution of just over £3,000 to the North Wealden Community Transport Partnership. The service travels between the Ashdown Forest, Uckfield and Heathfield.

Staffing

During the year, we saw a couple of changes in staffing with the recruitment of a new Facilities Manager, and welcomed new members of staff to the organisation in our caretaking, grounds maintenance and restaurant teams.

A new online training system has been introduced to ensure personal learning and development remains important in the workplace; not forgetting the need to keep health and safety at the forefront of our day to day working practices. A number of policies and procedures were updated including staff probation and appraisal policies, to ensure line managers make adequate time to review staff's progress, their personal development and staff make time for in-depth two way conversations. The new procedures will commence shortly.

On a personal level I would like to thank ALL of the staff who work for Uckfield Town Council for all their hard work and dedication. They have been of great support to me in my role as Chairman of General Purposes Committee.

Environment and Leisure Committee



New to the role of Chairman of Environment and Leisure Committee, I have had a great year delving into the detail of our grounds management, green open spaces, leisure activities and events.

It has been a particularly busy year and a number of projects that had been prioritised, have been achieved. The final touches to Hughes Way play area were made in the spring of 2018, with the support of Churchcoombe Residents' Association and Tesco Bags of Help. The upgraded facilities were a welcome introduction to the play area, and have been well received by local families.

Working with Stavertons Nursery, the Town Council introduced a new allotment competition, which saw prize winners selected for the best kept allotment on each site, the most creative allotment plot, the tallest sunflower for the young person's award entry and an overall winning prize for the best kept allotment in Uckfield. I was honoured to present the awards to the winners at the annual allotment conference, and support the growth of local produce, the benefits that allotments bring to health and wellbeing and promoting self-sufficiency.

Did you know that in the region of 70 litter bins are owned by the Town Council and placed on Town Council land? This is in addition to the bins provided along public highways and rights of way, and collected by Wealden District Council's waste contractor. Despite this, the town continues to see a number of people drop litter or not pick up dog mess, day after day. This is not only unsightly but also a risk to wildlife, and young children in the case of dog fouling. We continue to support Brighter Uckfield and would like to thank them and the individual residents who use their own time voluntarily to keep Uckfield clean and attractive. The Town Council agreed in 2018, to work with a company called Tikspac to provide ten dog bag dispensers in our open spaces to provide bags to dog owners whilst they are out walking. We also launched a campaign to advise that 'any bin will do.' You don't need to use a specific dog litter bin to dispose of dog waste, any general litter bin will do.

Safety on the roads has continued to remain a priority for the Town Council. The past year has seen a working group set up to re-institute the speed indicator device, and with training use this device at key locations around the town to raise awareness of speed restrictions and make drivers think twice whilst travelling through the town. The Town Council agreed to contribute to the purchase of software to be used by local community speedwatch groups and has continued to hold another successful safety day in Luxford Field with children from the local Uckfield primary schools. The event is an excellent way of educating young people about matters of safety whether it be on the highway, pedestrian, cliff edge, railway etc, in an interactive way. Preparations are already underway for this year's 'Children Stay Safe Day' taking place in June 2019.

Further enhancements have been made to some of our green open spaces including a new boundary fence between Ridgewood Recreation Ground and the Millennium Green. New noticeboards have been added to the areas of Elizabeth Gardens and Harlands Farm, to improve communication with residents walking through these areas. A drone code was also established by the Environment and Leisure Committee to be adhered to if members of the public are using drones in our open spaces. In the main, drones are used as a hobby and for fun, but with increasing concerns in the media about how drones can be misused, the Committee were keen to see some guidance established. Work is still continuing with the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs to create byelaws for the Hempstead Meadows and West Park Nature Reserves. It is hoped that a final draft will be ready this year for publication.

The agreement is now in place with St. Philip's Catholic School to make the pedestrian access between Victoria Pleasure Ground and the school grounds, permanent. The intention of this agreement was to increase safety for school pupils at drop off and collection times. We are working closely with the primary school to monitor how this works and to ensure that there are no difficulties created for users of the pleasure ground, nearby residential properties or businesses.

We must not forget the attractive hanging basket and floral displays within the town during the summer months and the beautiful Christmas lights in the town centre during the festive season. A lot of work goes on behind the scenes to bring these to the town and the Town Council works with some excellent local contractors to safely install these. These additions along with improvements to existing spaces such as the walled area in Library Way are important to the Town Council and help to make Uckfield an attractive place to live and work.

Events continue to be an important part of the town's annual calendar, and evidence of the fantastic level of community spirit within the town. The Town Council continues to support the various events that take place in the town, and the communication of these. The Town Council itself held another successful Weald on the Field in August 2018 with the support of Wealden District Council, Uckfield Chamber of Commerce and Food Rocks. Plans are already underway for this year's free event, with stalls selling local produce, streetfood, local crafts, pop up bars and live entertainment, so keep Saturday 3rd August 2019 clear in your diary and if you want to be involved, let us know!

Finally I would like to say a big thank you to our grounds staff who do a brilliant job every day to ensure our town remains clean, green and our open spaces, nature reserves and play parks are well managed. They are always first on the scene and their dedication is much appreciated. I would like to thank the Town Clerk and office staff for all of the amazing support they have provided over the last year.

Plans Committee

The Town Council is classed as a statutory consultee on all Uckfield-based planning applications and is therefore required by Wealden District Council – the local planning authority – to offer comments on all planning applications.

The Plans Committee of Uckfield Town Council comprises of seven members and has met on 17 occasions throughout the past year. At these meetings, 74 submitted planning applications were considered. In addition, a further 22 planning applications were reviewed, the timing of which fell outside the normal cycle of meetings.



The applications received during the past year comprised of a mixture of domestic, commercial, retail and leisure properties including Listed Building Consent.

One of the most important consultations of 2018-19 was the proposed submission document for the Wealden Local Plan. A full consultation process commenced in September 2018, and required detailed consideration of each section. The Town Council asked for the views of all Town Councillors and then a small working group compiled their feedback into themed responses specific to key paragraphs and sections within the main document. The final submission document was submitted to the Planning Inspector in January 2019, and the first stage of the examination by the appointed Planning Inspector is due to begin in May 2019. In order to consider the Ashdown Forest and mitigate the impact of traffic flows and house building on the natural habitats there (both flora and fauna), there are limited proposals for large scale development within Uckfield's parish boundary, going forward. The development of 1,000 homes in Ridgewood is due to be delivered in stages over the next five to ten years and will have the most impact on the town's infrastructure. Copies of the January 2019 submission document and accompanying appendices are available to view in the Town Council office. Once finalised and adopted, the Local Plan will set clear physical boundaries and planning policies which developers will need to adhere to and meet, to redevelop and build in the Wealden District.

The committee and wider full council have reviewed the plans to redevelop Uckfield College, off Downsview Crescent. Briefings were held at the start of 2018 on the proposals, and as we draw this municipal year to a close, the hoarding is already up and contractor portacabins installed ready for works to begin.

The Town Council reviewed the plans put forward for the redevelopment and refurbishment of the Ridgewood Village Hall.

The Town Council has also supported the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group with the development of a Neighbourhood Plan for Uckfield. The documents are currently being prepared for a scoping process with key partner agencies before being updated for public consultation. Once the plan has been adopted, future developments in Uckfield will attract a greater proportion of Community Infrastructure Levy funding, which can be used for improving the local infrastructure.

I would like to thank my fellow council members for their considered valuable comments and contributions at all of the meetings.
