A FOOD AND COMMUNITY STORY

In the first few months of being a new Town Councillor, I presented a motion on youth food poverty to the Town Council which my fellow Councillors passed.

The council resolved to:

- investigate the size of youth food poverty in Uckfield primary and secondary schools and, to our best abilities, try to reduce it within the life of this council;
- work with external bodies (Foodcycle and Chomp) to assist in tackling food poverty in young people;
- run an information campaign to inform the public on how to deal with food poverty using local charities and government aids. This could include advising councillors in order to enable them to spread the word;
- work closely with schools to see what assistance is needed to help reduce the effects of food poverty in their students (i.e. breakfast and after school clubs).

According to Uckfield Foodbank, 24 per cent of households in Uckfield live in poverty. For these households an unexpected bill, a delay in receiving wages or benefits, a long-term illness or no access to free school meals during school holidays could easily mean families need help from a foodbank.

Community Fridge

In the weeks following the motion, I met Amy Fieldhouse, a local mother with a passion for this cause. Amy was looking into setting up a community fridge; a simple way of sharing good food that would otherwise go to waste. The idea is to cut food waste around



town as well as lower the food mile. This is a little way the community can ease the effects of climate change as well as enjoy local produce from friends and neighbours. Investigations into the size of food poverty in our schools are about to begin, as well as conversation with the Brighton-based charity Chomp in the hope of opening out-of-term-time food clubs. We have other plans in the pipeline including community herb gardens and share shelves at the allotments.

Early Stages

We are still in the early stages, but we look forward to announcing more on the community fridge in the near future and giving you an update on our progress later this year. 

Creating Local Nature Reserve Byelaws

The Town Council has responsibility for the management of two nature reserves in Uckfield – Hempstead Meadows and West Park Local Nature Reserves. These are beautiful green open spaces and require the council to find a balance between protecting the local wildlife and biodiversity, whilst enabling local residents and visitors to enjoy the attractive views and environment.



Working with DEFRA

The Town Council has been working with the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs for some time now, to create suitable byelaws for our local nature reserves. We have to ensure that they are clear, reasonable and proportionate and do not conflict with any existing legislation. Byelaws can help to stop people damaging the nature reserves, by setting restrictions on certain activities or movement in certain areas, and these byelaws can be enforced.

Sealing of the byelaws

On 20 January 2020, the Town Council resolved to authorise the sealing of the byelaws, and requested that the Town Clerk carry out the next steps and procedures. The Town Council has now advertised its intention for applying for confirmation of the byelaws and made these available for inspection by the public in the Town Council office. The Town Council office is based in the Civic Centre, Uckfield and open between the hours of 9.00am and 5.00pm, Monday to Thursday, 9,00am to 4.00pm on Friday.
