TAKING TIME OUT...

It's not until you venture out into the town's open spaces and woodlands that you remember how important it is to take time out to breathe in the fresh air, observe the local birds and wildlife, and appreciate what Uckfield truly has to offer.

If you fancy a change of scenery, the Ashdown Forest, Barcombe Mills, Cuckoo Trail, Horsted Green park, and the South Downs are only a short drive away. Uckfield, meanwhile, has so much for free right on the doorstep.

Uckfield itself hosts two local nature reserves (Hempstead Meadows and West Park), Millennium Green (Ridgewood), two ancient woodlands (Boothland Wood and Nightingale Wood) and countless open spaces. You can make a circular route of the town, heading north west from West Park through to Lake Wood, or heading north east towards Buxted Park (SSSI). Perhaps take a short break from working at home by sitting in the nature reserves. Take the longer route home after the school run or work, or make yourself a circular route on your lunch break.

Walks for the weekends

With Uckfield ideally placed as a hoppingoff point for the entire south east, there is a huge list of local options for how to get active in the great outdoors.

It can be carried out in bitesize chunks or part of an organisation's commitment to enable all staff to undertake volunteering days. Initiatives such as taster days, away days, school visits, events and more can be arranged with their support. Volunteering is also an excellent way to learn more about a particular interest or career, helping you decide on a new career path and build your CV, or help to build confidence and meet new people.

REMEMBRANCE SERVICES

In keeping with normal tradition, Remembrance Service will take place at The Church of Holy Cross, Belmont Road, Uckfield, on Sunday 10 November 2024 at 3:00pm.

The parade will form in Luxford Car Park and those taking part, will be asked to gather in the 10-hour section of the car park (TN22 1AL) before proceeding to The Church of the Holy Cross for the Remembrance Service via Civic Approach, Uckfield High Street and Church Street.



After the service and the laying of the wreaths, the parade will reform and return to Luxfords Car Park via Church Street, Uckfield High Street and Library Way where the Mayor of Uckfield, Cllr. Karen Bedwell, will take the salute.

Importance of the event

This is a commemoration of huge importance to Uckfield, as is demonstrated every year with the sizeable attendance from exservicepeople, members of the local community and representatives of local government levels.

Much preparation goes into ensuring the day correctly honours those who gave their lives to protect our own, and this year will be no difference. The schedule of the day, as planned by organisers, is as follows:

Timings of the day

2:00pm - Guests and participants to meet in Luxford Car Park (TN22 1AL). 2:35pm - Parade departs for the Church.

3:00pm - Remembrance Service at the Church.

3:50pm - Wreath laying and playing of the Last Post.

4:10pm - Parade reforms and returns to Luxfords Car Park via Library Way, where the Town Mayor will take the salute.

Armistice Day – Monday 11 November 2024

As well as the commemorative events taking place on Remembrance Sunday, there will be a short service and maroons fired at the War Memorial outside of the Church of the Holy Cross at 11:00am on the morning of Armistice Day.
